In addition to this, the paper will also focus on the standing of minority groups in these countries it has been observed that oftentimes contestations regarding gender and minority studies overlap each other. The aim of this review will be to see how literature written in BRICS countries address the themes of gender and minority rights.

Further, it will seek to understand the commonalities (if any) in these triggers which could lead to the coming together of a category.

Such a review will enable a better understanding of the social milieu of BRICS countries. Select works of fiction for this review will be mainly considered from Indian, South African and Brazilian literary corpus.
